This story comes from the Bible. It is a story of Jesus.




Jesus said, "You have one God. The first rule is to love God with all your heart, soul, mind, and strength." Jesus said, "The second rule is to love other people as you love yourself."

When they made food, they did not say, "This food is only for me." Instead they shared the food with others.


If someone needed money or a place to live, the people said, "We can help." Everyone was taken care of; no one was in need.








### Neighbors enjoy a snack together!
